The 43rd GSCM annual meeting was held on Tuesday, May 10th at Martin's. The Girl Scout Gold Award is the highest award in Girl Scouting. Using the leadership and organizational skills gained through their Girl Scout experiences, Senior girls developed and implemented a Girl Scout Gold Award project that will have a positive and lasting impact on the community. Examples of the projects Girl Scouts implemented are: a brochure that includes research and information about infertility for cancer patients; maintenance and repair of hiking trails; refurbishing and re-construction of a facility that serves the homeless; design of a play-area in the neo-natal ward of a local hospital; and a workshop designed to prepare students and their families for middle-school and beyond.

The banquet keynote speaker was United States Naval Academy (USNA) Midshipman First Class Vanessa Guthrie (pictured above with GSCM President and CEO). A Girl Scout for 16 years and now a lifetime member, Guthrie served as president of the USNA Campus Scouts before reporting for duty in Yosuka, Japan on May 27th as a Nuclear Surface Warfare Officer. Midshipman Guthrie encouraged the girls to continue to pursue their dreams and to continue to be leaders in their communities.

P.A.V.E. Stretches Out

April 14th ended an eight week yoga workshop given by the Girl Scouts of Central Maryland for young ladies 7 to 15 years old. This workshop is the first of a series of workshops the council will be providing for Baltimore City Youth in an effort to reach and

teach them life skills that include self-empowerment, etiquette, confidence, self-acceptance and awareness.



Jana Long, Instructor and Manager of Power of One Yoga, LLC, sponsored eight Saturdays of integrative yoga therapy. The young ladies also learned the proper way to enter and leave a room, how to make introductions and eye contact, how to formally set a table for dinner parties, how to pamper their bodies and, above all, how to

expect to be treated by their peers and adults based on how they carried and treated themselves.

"Some of our youth lack basic etiquette and social decorum and this yoga workshop will not only serve them well as they move into adulthood, but it will also help them to develop the skill of self presentation, social interaction and understanding their motivations, all of which can serve them for a life time," said Ms. Long a certified yoga instructor and founder of The Power of One Yoga.

This particular workshop was attended by females only but future sessions dealing with different social issues, will include males as well. GSCM plans to bring additional Saturday programs to girls (and boys) aged 7-15 years: self-defense for girls, kick boxing for boys and girls, yoga, fitness and nutrition, and supplemental educational opportunities.

Troop coordinator Carolyn McQuaige Howard said that each of the pre-pageant activities and workshops were designed to help the young ladies make good choices in life and the right choices for themselves.

To that end, the pageant's proceeds will help finance a southern college tour in 2006-2007 so that the girls and their families can explore college options.

Howard, who expressed her pride in the girls and what they accomplished, encourages the girls to stay on the course to excellence, "Take out your journals and remind yourselves of your goals and the things you want to accomplish in life. You have much to offer the world."

For troop leader Ava Lisa Macon the most rewarding thing about being a troop leader is the friendships she builds with her girls. "I love the fact that kids aren't jaded yet. They believe anything's possible, and that kind of faith gives ME the motivation I need to keep being a leader."

A troop leader for 8 years now, Ava Lisa says she became a troop leader out of necessity. When her oldest daughter became a Brownie Girl Scout they joined a first year troop that formed and met at a local church. "It was a wonderful year. The girls formed fast friendships and the mothers formed a solid support system for the troop." However, she explained, because of other commitments, the leaders were unable to continue in that capacity. "The incredible troop we'd only just found was going to disband," she recalls. "With no other options available, I agreed to take on the troop with another troop mom."

Over time she and her co-leader wound up running Brownie and Junior

troops simultaneously. Currently she is the leader of a Cadette/Senior troop of 16 girls. "I hope [the girls] will internalize this philosophy: Life's an adventure. Don't chicken out on the hard stuff or you'll miss the most fun ever. I don't care if they mess up or make mistakes, in Girl Scouts or in life, we're all human. But I do expect my girls to roll up their sleeves and do real work...they know that if they do what's necessary they'll reap rewards."

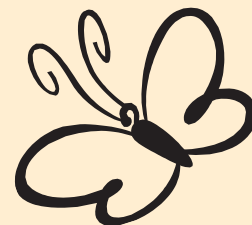
