I recently attended a GSUSA meeting in New York with leaders from other Girl Scout Councils to rethink the way in which we communicate our core strategy of creating a unique girl-only place where a girl finds:

- Confidence by discovering her abilities;*
- Character through experiences that shape her values*
- Connections through friendships with other girls;*
- and, where a girl returns those gifts by making the world a better place.*

In our discussions, I think we all agreed that within our own Councils we all work very hard to create this. Indeed, through the stories and opportunities you will find in this issue of GirlsWorld, I am sure that you will agree that much of this goes on in central Maryland. In March our girls took part in the Annual Maryland Legislative Day assuming the roles of legislators; many of our girls have planned and implemented their service projects in order to earn Girl Scout Silver, Bronze and Gold awards; GSteens are finding their voices and using them to shape programs and activities; and, plans and preparations are being made so that girls will have wonderful experiences at day and resident camps this summer.

At the same time, we all agreed too, that with fine tuning, our messages could reflect one of the best integrated personal/leadership development models with activities and defined outcomes for girls 5-17 and flexible opportunities for participation. This model would demonstrate diversity-through our girls and volunteers-and incorporate community and global service, action and citizenship by way of updated practices and traditions. I hope that I can count on your support in this effort. This task takes time, financial investments, and commitment--it's what has made our programs work in the past, and it will continue to make them last well into the future. I look forward to working with each of you--girls, volunteers, members of the Board of Directors, supporters and friends-as we strive to achieve this goal. I also look forward to seeing each of you at our Annual Meeting on May 10th at Martin's West.

Troop Goes for Bronze with Family Share Project

The girls, along with the help of their troop leaders, made their final decision based on their likes: they like planning and hosting events; they like doing things with little kids; and they like having fun! The girls also wanted to make sure that their project would benefit the community. The result--Family Fun Night to benefit Family Share.



Family Share is an annual giving campaign where Girl Scout families make contributions-in any amount that they can-to GSCM. Family Share gifts help support our website-a key communication tool that gets information to our volunteers, girls and their families. In addition, our website offers an online Girl Scout technology club-Girl's TEK-and "It's a Girl Thing!," a section full of information and fun activities for all Girl Scout program age levels. Family Share also helps volunteers with the costs associated with leader training and troop first aiders. Thanks to Family Share, girls can now take part in the Challenge Ropes Course at Camp Conowingo and girls, who



would otherwise be unable to for financial reasons, get to take part in troop activities.

To ensure that the event would be successful, Troop 2326 started planning their night of fun in October. They made flyers to pass out to friends and neighbors, they came to their Service Unit meeting to explain their project and distribute flyers, and they came to the mall sleep-in to spread the word about their event. They had even contacted business members of the community and were able to secure donations that were used as door prizes.



Arts & crafts were assembled, circle games were set-up, Twister and Bingo callers were identified, Karaoke songs and CDs were chosen and snacks were made. In the end, their support of each other-many of whom have been troop members since first grade-and Girl Scouts came shining through. "The enthusiasm, work ethic, and motivation the girls showed us through the process really impressed us," said troop leaders Donna

Girl Scouts Lead the Way at Maryland State Capital

Tuition Aid for Tomorrow's Leaders

Girl Scouts and troop leaders from central Maryland, Chesapeake Bay Council and Nations Capital were on hand February 8th to present testimony before the Maryland House of Delegates' Appropriations Committee in support of House Bill 296: Higher Education-Tuition Exemption-Eagle Scouts and Girl Scout Gold Award Recipients.

The bill would provide “a certain waiver of tuition and mandatory fees for certain students attending public institutions of higher education who are either Eagle Scouts or Girl Scout Gold Award recipients and meet certain residency requirements....” If passed the legislation would take effect July 2, 2005.

Dilana Pickett, GSCM Program Specialist and Girl Scout Gold Award recipient presented testimony to the Committee before a standing room only crowd comprised of Girls Scouts, Boy Scouts and troop leaders. “We have to be willing to empower our young people through organizations like Girl Scouts and through initiatives such as Bill 296,” Ms Pickett asserted. “[The Girl Scout Gold Award] is an honor for achieving practical application. Many scholarships award for far less. I think it is unfortunate that our system is more willing to invest thousands of dollars in those who are talented in sports....Our society could use more youth involved in building up our community, serving our nation, and developing plans to make change and improvement happen.”

Girl Scout Gold Award recipient Amanda Cohen, told legislators that staying in scouting in high school was not an easy choice. “Instead of doing the things that many of my peers and some of my friends did, I chose to get involved in community service activities and projects that help other people.” She added, “[Girl Scout]Gold Award recipients are motivated and active in our schools and community.”

Girl Scout mom Barbara Cohen echoed this sentiment telling the legislators, “Passage of this bill would send the message: ‘We value the work of our leaders of tomorrow’.”



Legislative Session Steers Girls' Discussion

Teen Girl Scouts and their leaders converged on the State House in Annapolis on March 10th to learn about the legislative process and meet with their Senators and Delegates.

With boxes of Girl Scout cookies in hand, the girls met with their Delegates and Senators to discuss local issues and to inform them of the Council's current fundraising efforts to restore the Bell Manor Mansion located on the grounds of Camp Conowingo. The girls also participated in a mock legislative session and committee hearing discussing new regulations for teen-age drivers. The girls became quite engaged in the topic causing a spirited debate and subsequent amendment voting by the mock legislators.

“This is my favorite Girl Scout event all year!” exclaimed Noor Oweis who came to Annapolis ready to talk with her Senator about Bell Manor funding and college tuition prices. She and one of her troop members are high school National Education Association representatives. They also talked with their Senator about some of the problems impacting teachers' pensions.

“He seemed very interested and engaged during the time he spent with us. I think he enjoyed getting our perspectives on some of the issues.” With aspirations of becoming a Senate Page during her senior year, Noor said, “this experience is awesome!”

After the legislative session, girls had an opportunity to tour the State House and the Naval Academy where they met Naval Academy Campus Girl Scouts.

Slate Turns to Bronze

While attending a training session at Camp Conowingo, Troop 1291's leader looked at the slate roof tiles heaped in a pile and got the idea to paint and stencil them for use as decorative tiles. She made an inquiry at the camp and was put in touch with Mary Cloud, a Friends of Bell Manor volunteer. Soon after, the Troop of 12 Juniors was invited to spend the weekend at Camp Conowingo and work with Friends of Bell Manor volunteers to paint, stencil and decorate roof tiles.

"The girls were real troopers in their efforts to create slate art pieces," their troop leader noted. "They just kept painting away." Part of their

the girls made Christmas, animal, bird, landscape "Welcome" and other designs on the slate pieces which varied in size from 6 to 8 inches.

New leaders and their daughters were invited for a fun-filled day at Camp Conowingo. The goal was to welcome new leaders and co-leaders, encourage them in their new roles, and provide opportunities for them to:

Over 30 mother-daughter pairs from Baltimore and Harford Counties participated in the "camp" despite the snow and icy weather. The day began with two SWAP activities: the Promise and Law SWAP and the Friendship Stick. Team building and group formation were a major focus of many of the activities.

The day was designed so that new leaders would learn new games that they

could then take back and use with their troops.

A favorite game was "Frenzy", where girls work as teams to gather 70 bouncing balls into a hula-hoop while other teams work simultaneously on the same task. (The trick is, not moving the balls but moving your team's hula hoop.)

The "campers" also talked about troop sizing, troop stability, and the importance of Family Share and how it benefits each troop and the council. After lunch, leaders and their daughters explored a snow-covered Camp Conowingo on a "visual scavenger hunt". The day ended with a "Scouts Own" ceremony and a Friendship Circle.

NEW! Streamlined Courses Ease Training Load

This summer the Volunteer Services & Recruitment (VS&R) Department will introduce three new streamlined courses. Enrichment classes will be offered to allow volunteers to learn new skills when she/he is ready.

Leadership in Girl Scouting-- replaces much of the current Orientation, Introduction and basic trip planning of Step Out. This 3.5 hour course focuses on Safety Wise, GSUSA & GSCM policies, money matters and what Girl Scouting stands for. Upon completion of this course, volunteers will be ready to work with girls and take them on simple field trips.

Let's Go Camping -- replaces **Step Out, Stay Out** and **Camp Out** and consists of a four hour planning meeting, followed by a 24 hour camp-out about a week later. Participants, in patrols, will plan and shop for meals, learn and practice outdoor skills and Leave No Trace. Upon completion, participants will be able to take girls on any type of over night outing in lodges, tents & teepees.

Those who have already taken **Step Out/Stay Out/Camp Out** do not need to recertify. If you did not recertify in 2004 you will need to take this new class in order to be the adult in charge on a camp-out.

Working with Teen Girl Scouts-- replaces **Cadette** and **Senior** classes and explores the Studio 2B philosophy, the transition from Leader to Advisors and the wide variety of opportunities available to girls 11-17. Upon completion of this course, volunteers may choose enrichment classes, that can be taken at any time, based upon the goals of the girls they work with.

Volunteer Corner



“I think people who help others, especially those with little power, are totally enriched by it,” proclaims Lula Sessoms, a 12-year Girl Scouts of Central Maryland volunteer. Lula--Miss Lula, as she is affectionately called by many of the girls and women she works with, is a Girl Scouts’ Beyond Bars and Reading Rocks program volunteer.

“I saw an article in the newspaper about the Beyond Bars program and the need for volunteers,” she explained. “I came to the meeting and got hooked--it was like an instant friendship. Marina Gethers and Robin Gamble were at the meeting--it was a nice group of people to work with. That was 12 years ago and I am still here.”

Over the years she has developed relationships with many of the women, girls and guardians that have been a part of the Beyond Bars program. She remembers going to the hospital for one of the women at the detention center: “She wanted me to go and tell her mom how sorry she was for all the pain and trouble she had caused her.” When her mom died, Lula recalled, “I went to the funeral to speak on her behalf.”

“When we treat people with respect and kindness God loves you a little more.”

Before working with the program, prison and the mothers in them really meant nothing to her. “Now, my life will never be the same, and the people that we meet will never be the same” she declared. “I realized that these people are humans who have had a bad turn in their lives and,” she added, “I am a better person for it. When we treat people with respect and kindness God loves you a little more.”

She also enjoys working with Reading Rocks--a program geared toward building self-esteem in second through fourth graders. “All of the books help children learn to like themselves and to be helpful to each other,” she said. “Each of them always remember the first book, ‘I Like Me.’”

“There is so much work to do and so few people to do it,” Lula emphasized. “I hope the people who read this will devote their time and talents to those in need. I’m 67 years old and I’ve done it for 12 years. I can’t quit because there’s no one coming along to replace me. WE NEED REPLACEMENTS--it changes your life for the better. My life is better because of the Girl Scouts Beyond Bars program.”
